During the process of the Inglewood Village Plan process some years ago, I sensed a real distaste amongst many village residents for the compact urban form – including some townhouses – that was being proposed for what is known as the “Bandiera property” – as if row housing was ‘beneath’ Caledon and would attract undesirable residents. (The developer decided, in fact, to revive an old approval and proceed with an estate-lot development form, although it has not yet been built.) B.) I would like to see a serious exploration of the revival of public transit by rail. APPENDIX B: TOWN HALL MEETING REPORTS

1 About the Town Hall Meeting Round 1

The first round of Town Hall meetings for the Town of Caledon's Community-Based Strategic Plan (CBSP) and Vision took place over two evenings, on the following days:

- Wednesday December 9, 2009, 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.
- Thursday December 10, 2009, 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.

The Town Hall meetings were convened by the Town of Caledon with assistance from Lura Consulting and Hardy Stevenson and Associates Limited (HSAL). The meetings events were managed and facilitated by Lura Consulting and HSAL.

The general purpose of the first round of Town Hall meetings was to introduce the idea of the Community-Based Strategic Plan and Vision, and to provide an overview of Caledon's current situation. The Town Hall meetings also provided an opportunity to consult with members of the general public on their future vision for Caledon, and assemble current and local knowledge regarding community values, goals and actions required to achieve those goals.

The Town Hall Meetings were held at two locations across the Town of Caledon:

- Inglewood Public Library, West (December 9, 2009)
- Caledon Centre for Recreation and Wellness, East (December 10, 2009)

In total, 35 members of the public registered at the first round of Town Hall Meetings.

2 Common Themes presented by the Breakout Groups:

It is evident that the residents of Caledon value similar aspects of their community. Frequently cited responses regarding what is valued in Caledon were: unparalleled community safety, green space, volunteerism, recreational spaces, the viable agricultural industry, and the many unique communities that make up Caledon.

When addressing their hopes for the future of the Caledon, the current values of the residents were reiterated as they expressed the importance of maintaining the aspects that they enjoy and value now.

The participants also identified areas of improvement for the Town of Caledon. During both meetings, the residents expressed the need to diversify housing options; particularly for senior's, the need for the development of a place for higher-learning (i.e. post-secondary institution), the need for a safe route system that would connect the many smaller communities and that could be used by residents of all ages, the need for new recreational facilities, more engagement of citizens, and increased Council support for resident opinions.

During both town hall meetings, there was significant discussion regarding appropriate growth levels and the speed of development. Many residents felt that growth needed to be managed responsibly and in a way that is not disruptive to the type of rural life that is currently experienced in Caledon. The development of the white belt received mixed reviews, with most residents largely not in favour of the development in this region.

Participants also discussed the actions required to achieve the set goals for Caledon. Many participants emphasized the need for on-going conversations between the public and Council. The participants also

communicated that if the CBSP was given enough teeth (i.e. all development proposals should be reviewed and contrasted with this document) that the future of Caledon would indeed look the way they envisioned it.

- It seems we are already shooting down ideas before we have even started. If you say you don't want growth you are limiting the brainstorming and visioning. We need to start with a blank slate and big blue sky thinking.

- It would be interesting to see the input provided by each Ward.
- This community has seen many plans over the years, and it seems that at the end of the day the province or Region does what it wants, so many of us feel jaded.
- We (attendees) are concerned about some of the comments from the first Town Hall Meeting. In particular, the comment from an individual resident demanding the quick development of the white belt. It is our unanimous opinion (*attendees at Town Hall Meeting # 2*), that quick development of the white belt is unwanted, and further we feel our view better echo's the view of the majority of Caledon residents. We do not want this one comment to bias the report of the general feelings of the residents as this view is rarely encountered in our community.
- What role does the civic engagement process have in the final report? What impact will the civic engagement have in the final report?
- Why do the residents rely on Council to move these ideas forward?
- Where will this report go when it is finished? How do we keep the ideas unveiled in this visionary report top of mind for Council and the community?
- What are the opportunities for local residents and businesses to partner with Council in order to develop a partnership or strategic committee that would continue these sustainable ideas? Something similar to CEAC to provide and maintain momentum around this project. A good partnership or committee would require staff resources to ensure feasibility and continuity of this type of program.
- How is social media being incorporated into this community based plan and vision?
- If we want to strive for a lower population we need to plan how to make that sustainable. How do we survive with a low population? We still need a plan.
- Are the population growth targets in the presentation a done deal?
- Do we have an opportunity to question provincial representatives about how they want us to develop?

1 About the Town Hall Meeting Round 2

The second round of Town Hall meetings for the Town of Caledon's Community-Based Strategic Plan (CBSP) and Vision took place over two evenings, on the following days:

- Thursday March 25, 2010, 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.
- Monday March 29, 2010 7:00 – 9:00 p.m.

The Town Hall meetings were convened by the Town of Caledon with assistance from Lura Consulting and Hardy Stevenson and Associates Limited (HSAL). The meetings events were managed and facilitated by Lura Consulting and HSAL.

The purpose of the second round of public consultation (March 2010 to April 2010) was to provide the public and various interest groups an opportunity to vet the draft framework and ensure it accurately reflects community aspirations. It was also an opportunity to think boldly about how the existing and proposed actions could be revised and/or bolstered.

The Town Hall Meetings were held at two locations across the Town of Caledon:

- Brampton Christian School (March 25, 2010)
- Caledon Community Complex (March 29, 2010)

In total, 65 members of the public registered at the second round of Town Hall Meetings.

2 Community Feedback

GOAL 1:

Strategic Objective: Protect Natural Resources and Agriculture

Actions:

- Engage farmers in their ideas
- Community to say what they need for local support for farming
- Buying local to be promoted
- Support local markets
- Wellness catalogue for eating and buying locally
- Promote natural resources and agriculture on website
- Include an "Eat local" section in Caledon newsletters and other materials
- Need to promote Foodland
- Rally CAS share
- Subsidize youth to work on farms
- Farm fund for local fund, earmark for farm support for legitimate farmers
- Community education events (re: value of farming)
- Allocate Whitelands back to Greenbelt
- Town needs a strong vision for aggregate planning, there may be a role for the province in this;
- We should aim to create a certain percentage of renewable energy through the Town, to be self-sufficient in energy production;
- We can take advantage of small hydro;
- Draft business cases for protecting the environment, energy conversation businesses, a holistic community energy plan;
- Assist farmers with new opportunities and green business;
- Create a whole system approach not a silos approach;

- Air quality to be addressed through a move away from fossil fuel use;
- We need a restoration/rehabilitation plan to address all the aggregate craters/pits; and
- We need a plan for source water protection of water.

GOAL 2:

Strategic Objective: Promote Aging in Place

- Accommodations for seniors
- Flexible homes and housing
- More condos and smaller lots
- Adequate infrastructure of all kinds – sewer, high speed internet etc.;
- Transportation planning and high density planning – plan for diversity and much needed public transportation;
- Public transportation will allow for affordable housing – not everyone can afford to buy a car, people who need affordable housing also need other services;
- More senior centres;
- Build a local medical centre with specialists and doctors coming in couple days a week from other practices so people don't have to go to Mississauga, Brampton or Hamilton;
- We should be able to live in Caledon and not leave for any phase of our lives;
- Provide flexible land use zoning in all areas not just urban areas, so you don't penalize extended families who want to continue to live in Caledon;
- Many roads are in very bad shape and need to be renovated;
- Don't leave West Caledon behind; and
- We need more infrastructure.

GOAL 3:

Strategic Objective: Enhance Active Living Opportunities and Enhance Local Health Services

Actions:

- Secure more land for trails and hold people to fund the land
- Start planning for hospital in Caledon
- Get information out form a youth and senior point of view regarding health and community activities;
- Address the communication disconnect - not all people have computers or daily newspapers, we need another avenue of communication;
- Equal communication to all parts of Caledon;
- Enhance local health services through out-patient clinics – need one in NW Caledon and in the smaller hamlets;
- Consider mobile clinics for seniors – addressing issues such as diabetes, arthritis, foot clinics etc.;
- Advertise what seniors are doing i.e. Smile Program;
- More sharing of the roads – promote cycling, pedestrian walkways, built shoulders on the road, educate the public on how to share the road with cyclists;
- I think this goal should be renamed to “live healthy and safely” – there are safety issue with crossing roads etc.
- The OPP Centre in downtown Bolton is not accessible – policing to be more accessible; and
- We need more activities for youth.

GOAL 4:

Strategic Objective: Preserve our Cultural Heritage, Agricultural and Natural heritage Landscapes, Built Heritage and Archaeological Resources

Actions:

- Build integrated natural form along berms
- Continue to promote heritage
- Enable experiences
- Outdoor amphitheatre
- Encourage residents to engage in the arts;
- Wisely manage cultural resources - who gets to identify what the value is of “cultural resources” – this needs to be addressed before you can preserve and protect these things;
- Walking tours may not work in all areas;
- Allow for better access for tour buses – better parking and access;
- You need to think about how tourism will work in this area;
- Encourage preservation of core areas and hamlets;
- Match architectural styles of new structures to where it will attach to the main cityscape or streetscape;
- Heritage buildings may not be eco-friendly – cannot have green roofs, we need to consider this;
- The sound barrier fences that go along some areas need to be fringed with trees, shrubs etc. to connect to the greenspaces that exists - focus on the fact that these are not just sound barriers but create visual impacts;
- Fund a performing arts center – not just in Bolton – available to all who can get there – in the centre of the community – this location needs to leverage existing infrastructure such as restaurants, cafes etc. so that people don’t just go home after a show but stay in town for dinner etc.;
- Fairs and festivals are important – these should be annual, so people will know what is happening throughout the year;
- Rotating fairs – crafts, arts, agriculture etc. The fair would travel throughout Caledon and connect the communities;
- There is an existing, very active official heritage committee as part of the Town; we meet on a monthly basis. There are over 100 designated heritage properties – buildings, bridges, roads etc. I encourage you all to join it – it is very active.

GOAL 5:

Strategic Objective: Meet Employment Needs

Actions:

- Encourage home offices
- Increase agri-business
- Appearance of plazas to be improved – needs small town signage, heritage buildings as retail
- We wanted to grow more economic involvement – need high speed accessibility – without it we will be preventing economic growth;
- We need high speed access from home not just business hubs;
- We need different types of industry – new kind of economic development – manufacturing, knowledge base industry etc.;
- Meeting employment needs through proper infrastructure;
- Business is profit motivated so we need to make it beneficial for businesses to move here – consider tourism, recreation, light industry – if we lower taxes, improve zoning etc. we can draw more business;
- Enhance entrepreneur areas such as recyclables and renewable;

Goal 1

- Some SAT members felt that the vision wasn't enough for Caledon
- Agriculture is a priority and figuring out how Agriculture will look should be defined using Actions that protect and zone land, as well as promoting local food, equestrian opportunities, and should be included within the Economic Goal
- Green building and energy standards should be included as actions and the Town should educate businesses and owners about how to get funding or reduce their footprint
- Look at the design and rehabilitation of Aggregate lands (look at Brampton for examples)

Goal 2

- SAT members agreed that we need to connect community of communities, however not necessarily to "complete" them
- Housing design for seniors needs to be universal flex design and accommodate for seniors looking to downsize
- Connect seniors to support programs, recreation opportunities, and facilities
- Land use needs to capture our country-side
- Encourage people to get to know their neighbours through community programs and festivals
